Bill Harrison hoped that the proclamation for Tim Thwing would be pulled from the consent agenda and read aloud. He spoke about the elevator repair, the agenda center and the contamination of the Sheetz site.

Dora Baltrusaitis, 320 South Pleasant, spoke against the 11 Mile project.

Woody Gontina, 1805 Greenleaf, spoke about elected officials who make decisions to make this a great place for the residents.

Alex Morford spoke in support of the 11 Mile project and was excited to see the 400 East Third Street project happen.

Joe Labataille, 709 Frederick, spoke in support of the 11 Mile project.

No name given, a new resident who is a transportation manager, was pleased to hear about the 11 Mile project.

Trevis Moore, 906 East 5th Street, spoke in support of the 11 Mile project.

No name given spoke about the 11 Mile project and the Gunn-Dyer park improvements.

Matt Callahan, Las Vegas Nevada, spoke about his history as the city engineer and the 11 Mile project. Keeping the street safe for the pedestrians.

Jim Rasor, 502 West Lincoln, spoke in favor of the 11 Mile project. He is in favor of parallel parking on 11 Mile in front of the businesses.

Dan Godek, 1121 East 3rd Street and member of the traffic committee, discussed the 11 Mile project.

Janice Wagman spoke about her public comment on the budget from the last meeting. Total headcount for the city is not flat compared to last year from page 287 of the budget. She spoke about the agenda center as well - keep the old version of agendas/documents posted. She is not in favor of the 11 Mile project.

# 7. Public Hearing on Brownfield Plan for Lincoln Place (200 East Lincoln Avenue)

Michael Nadolski from Champion Development Group and Joe Agostinelli from Michigan Growth Advisors spoke about the proposed brownfield project and answered questions from the commissioners.

Mayor Fournier opened the public hearing.

Alex Morford spoke in favor of this proposed project.

Nancy Poprafsky was not in favor of the project.

Bill Harrison spoke about the contaminated removal of the property as needed.

Whereas the City of Royal Oak has a brownfield redevelopment authority pursuant to Public Act 381 of 1996, the Brownfield Redevelopment Financing Act, as amended; and

Whereas the Brownfield Redevelopment Authority has determined that it is necessary for the achievement of the purposes of Act 381 to adopt a brownfield plan for 211 East Lincoln Avenue (parcel nos. 25-22-158-007 and 25-22-158-010) and 204 to 220 East 7th Street (parcel nos. 25-22-158-005 and 25-22-158-006); and

Whereas in accordance with Act 381, the Brownfield Redevelopment Authority recommended adoption of a brownfield plan to the City Commission for approval following a public hearing; and

Whereas the City Commission conducted a public hearing on June 23, 2025, on the brownfield plan attached hereto dated May 12, 2025.

Now, therefore, be it resolved that:

- 1. The City Commission concurs with the resolution adopted by the Brownfield Redevelopment Authority on May 20, 2025, and hereby approves the brownfield plan as requested by the petitioner attached hereto dated May 12, 2025.
- 2. The brownfield plan for 211 East Lincoln Avenue (parcel nos. 25-22-158-007 and 25-22-158-010) and 204 to 220 East 7th Street (parcel nos. 25-22-158-005 and 25-22-158-006) constitutes a public purpose, and that:
- 3. The brownfield plan meets the requirements set forth in Public Act 381 of 1996, as amended;
- 4. The proposed method of financing costs of eligible activities in the brownfield plan is feasible and the Brownfield Redevelopment Authority has the ability to arrange financing;
- 5. The costs of eligible activities in the brownfield plan are reasonable and necessary to carry out the purposes of Act 381 of 1996, as amended;
- 6. The amount of captured taxable value estimated to result from the adoption of the brownfield plan is reasonable; and
- 7. The brownfield plan is in reasonable accord with the Master Plan for the City of Royal Oak.
- 8. All resolutions and parts of resolutions insofar as they conflict with the provisions of this resolution shall be and the same are hereby rescinded.

# 8. Public Hearing on Commercial Rehabilitation District for Lincoln Place (200 East Lincoln Avenue)

Joe Agostinelli from Michigan Growth Advisors spoke to the commissioners and answered their questions.

Whereas, pursuant to Public Act 210 of 2005, as amended, the City of Royal Oak has the authority to establish "Commercial Rehabilitation Districts" within the City of Royal Oak at the request of a commercial business enterprise or on its own initiative; and

Whereas Lincoln and Troy, LLC, has filed a written request with the City Clerk of the City of Royal Oak requesting the establishment of the Commercial Rehabilitation District for an area in the vicinity of 211 East Lincoln Avenue (parcel nos. 25-22-158-007 and 25-22-158-010), 204 East 7<sup>th</sup> Street (parcel no. 25-22-158-005), and 220 East 7<sup>th</sup> Street (parcel no. 25-22-158-006), located in the City of Royal Oak hereinafter described; and

Whereas the City Commission of the City of Royal Oak determined that the district meets the requirements set forth in Section 2(b) of Public Act 210 of 2005, as amended; and

Whereas written notice has been given by certified mail to all owners of real property located within the proposed district as required by Section 3(3) of Public Act 210 of 2005, as amended; and

Whereas, on June 23, 2025, a public hearing was held and all residents and taxpayers of the City of Royal Oak were afforded an opportunity to be heard thereon; and

Whereas the City Commission deems it to be in the public interest of the City of Royal Oak to establish the Commercial Rehabilitation District as proposed.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the City Commission of the City of Royal Oak that the following described parcels of land situated in the City of Royal Oak, County of Oakland, and State of Michigan, to wit: T1N, R11E, SEC 22, ASSESSOR'S PLAT NO. 20, LOTS 1, 2, 7, 8 & 9, BLK 37; be and here is established as a Commercial Rehabilitation District pursuant to the provisions of Public Act 210 of 2005, as amended, to be known as the Lincoln Place Commercial Rehabilitation District.

# 9.i Resolution for Complete Streets, Vision Zero, and 11 Mile Safe Streets Application

Moved by: Commissioner Cheezum Seconded by: Commissioner Herzog

Whereas the Royal Oak Master Plan established a goal to ensure people who walk, roll, bicycle, drive, or use public transit are well accommodated throughout Royal Oak by optimizing and expanding shared and dedicated facilities, making streets safe for everybody, and connecting the city's many destinations.

Whereas Complete Streets are conducive to a connected city where safe, active, and ample space is provided for pedestrians, bicycles, transit riders alongside motorists and commercial vehicles.

Whereas Complete Streets incorporate planning, designing, constructing, operating, and maintaining streets that promote safe and convenient travel for people of all ages and abilities.

Whereas streets designed primarily for motorists increase the likelihood of fatalities and serious injury crashes involving a motor vehicle.

Whereas Vision Zero is an international road traffic safety initiative to implement actions to reach zero traffic-related deaths.

Whereas the City of Royal Oak commits to the goal of zero serious injuries and eliminating all road fatalities by December 31, 2030.

Whereas physical improvements along the 11 Mile Road corridor may incorporate Complete Streets design principles like appropriate width sidewalks, highly visible crosswalks, median islands, curb extensions, street trees and landscaping, lighting improvements, an appropriate number of travel lanes, and comfortable and accessible public transportation stops.

Whereas proposed physical improvements along the 11 Mile Road corridor will also significantly reduce serious traffic-related injuries and eliminate road fatalities.

Therefore be it resolved, the Royal Oak City Commission supports the submittal of a Safe Streets and Roads for All grant application to help fund the design and construction of the 11 Mile Road Corridor Improvement Project and,

Be it further resolved, the Royal Oak City Commission supports the development of a city-wide Complete Streets plan.

# 9.1 Proclamation Honoring the Public Service Career of Community and Economic Development Director Tim Thwing

Whereas, Tim Thwing was hired as a Planner III in 1991. Tim's technical acumen, professional initiative, and self-discipline led him to multiple promotions in his first 10 years, ending with the City's Director of Planning in 2001. In 2014, Tim was given the opportunity to serve as the Director of Community Development, which led to his oversight of economic development, planning, engineering, building, and code enforcement.

As a Planner III during the 90's, Tim took on a major contributor role in supporting Royal Oak's investment in its downtown streetscape, narrowing roads, widening sidewalks, increasing the urban canopy, and helping spur a boom in downtown retail, restaurants, and nightlife.

As Director of Planning during the 2000's, Tim oversaw the growth of midrise condos and apartments, adding hundreds of new units downtown, which built off the success of the previous decade.

Tim's leadership role as the Community Development Director allowed him to oversee a new era of civic reinvestment, including the transformation of Royal Oak's civic campus, the creation of Centennial Commons Park, the Police Headquarters update, and renovation of the Royal Oak Farmers Market.

Tim Thwing's 34 years of dedicated service to Royal Oak reflect a deep commitment to the built environment and the people who live, work, and visit here. His career is visible not just in plans and policies, but in the people, bricks, parks, and neighborhoods that define our city.

True to his character, Tim credits the successes of his career to those around him—his colleagues, city employees, elected officials, developers, business owners, and community volunteers. This humility is the mark of a public servant who has led with purpose and reminds us all of what it takes to build a thriving community.

Now, therefore, be it resolved, I, Mayor Fournier, and members of the Royal Oak City Commission on behalf of the entire Royal Oak Community do hereby extend our congratulations on the occasion of his retirement. Tim is a credit to this community, the Community Development Department, the Downtown Development Authority, and it's with heartfelt appreciation that we celebrate his achievement.

# 13.a Consideration of an Ordinance Amendment to Chapter 671 Taxation for a Payment In Lieu Of Taxes, First Reading

Moved by: Commissioner Kolo Seconded by: Commissioner Herzog

Whereas the Royal Oak City Commission has determined that 400 E. Third Limited Dividend Housing Association Limited Partnership's affordable and workforce housing development is a public necessity because it provides a "variety of housing that works for everyone" and fulfills the strategic goal of the city being a "welcoming, engaged, and livable community".

Whereas the Royal Oak City Commission understands that a Payment In Lieu of Taxes is a required local financial incentive under the Michigan State Housing Development Authority's Low Income Housing Tax Credit program that subsidizes the creation or preservation of affordable rental housing.

Whereas 400 E. Third Limited Dividend Housing Association Limited Partnership has requested a Payment In Lieu of Taxes as an additional financial incentive to make its mixed-income housing development a reality.

Therefore, be it resolved, the Royal Oak City Commission hereby approves, upon first reading, Ordinance Amendment 2025-04, to add a new Article III, Sections 671-24 through 671-33, to Chapter 671 Taxation of Part II: General Legislation; to provide for a service charge in lieu of taxes for a housing project for affordable and workforce housing financed with federal low income housing tax credits ("LITHC") pursuant to the provisions of the State Housing Development Authority Act of 1966 (1966 PA 346, as amended; MCL 125.1401, et seq) (The "Act")."

13.b Proposed Interlocal Agreement between City and Oakland County for Lockwood Mixed-income Housing: Oakland County Housing Trust Fund and City of Royal Oak American Rescue Plan Enabled Fund Transfer

Moved by: Commissioner Cheezum Seconded by: Mayor Pro Tem Hunt

Be it resolved, the Royal Oak City Commission hereby approves the Interlocal Agreement as revised between the City of Royal Oak and Oakland County for the transfer of \$1,950,000.00 in ARP-Enabled Funds from the City to the County in support of the Lockwood Income Restricted Housing Project, in conjunction with funding provided through the Oakland County Housing Trust Fund (OCHTF), and subject to the terms and obligations set forth in the agreement; and

Be it further resolved, the City Commission authorizes the City Attorney to approve reasonable and non-substantive amendments to the agreement as may be requested by Oakland County following its legal review and authorizes the Mayor and City Clerk to execute same.
